#### **PURPOSE**

To accept and consider submissions received during the public exhibition of the draft Real Country Destination Strategic Plan and the suite of Business Cases for priority projects.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Three deliverables were finalised under the 'Real Country' Business Case and Strategy Development collaborative project between Coonamble, Gilgandra and Warrumbungle Shires:

- Community Engagement Report (explaining how the community was engaged and what was learnt from that engagement, for the information of Council and the community).
- Draft Real Country Destination Strategic Plan (detailing the strategy and key points of focus for the development of a regional tourism industry).
- Draft Business Case documents for a priority project in each of the three Shires (giving detailed proposals, costings and ongoing operational costs – with Coonamble's being development of the Warrena Creek Reserve).

The draft Destination Strategic Plan and draft Business Cases were publicly exhibited during January and early February 2024.

The three Councils are now required to consider the submissions (tabled as a separate report), endorse the Strategic Plan and business cases (having taken the submissions into consideration) and implement the Strategic Plan and projects proposed in the business cases.

The tabling of submissions to Coonamble Shire Council is required to finalise the project's documentation in line with the funding deadlines set by the State Government, noting that three Councils are involved, with varying meeting schedules.

#### **BACKGROUND**

During the past three years Coonamble, Gilgandra and Warrumbungle Shire Councils have collaborated on the development of a regional tourism industry, using the branding of 'Real Country'.

The partnership was successful in attracting funding, under the Business Case and Strategic Development Fund, and engaged *People, Place and Partnership* to develop the required documentation.

The consultant visited each of the three regions and, in Coonamble, consulted the community in general and the Local Aboriginal Lands Council, accommodation and tourism providers.

This Real Country project is strategically aligned with State and local strategic plans and community priorities and vision for the future, particularly:

- The NSW Visitor Economy Strategy 2030
- Destination Country and Outback Destination Management Plan 2022-2030.
- Castlereagh and Western Plains Regional Economic Development Strategies.
- Individual Council's Community Strategic Plans and relevant strategy documents.

The infrastructure projects prioritised for the Business Cases centre on the natural beauty of the Castlereagh River and other waterways flowing through the Real Country region, with the stunning backdrop of the Warrumbungle Mountains. They also celebrate cultural diversity and recognise Wailwan, Gamilaraay and Wiradjuri Country.

The vision for the Real Country region is one of building economic resilience by lessening reliance on agriculture as the sole economic driver for local economies, which in times of drought, has significant negative impact on all sectors of the community. By developing the Real Country region as a destination for tourists, their spending will contribute to sustaining local businesses during such times. The Destination Strategic Plan sets out how to accomplish this.

The Business Cases offer investment-ready projects for future funding opportunities.

It was agreed among the three participating Councils that the value of each of the catalyst Business Case projects would each be of some \$5 million.

It should be noted that the initial project site in Coonamble was at Smith Park, however, following community consultation with accommodation providers, service organisations and clubs and the general community, this focus was shifted to the Warrena Creek Reserve that was identified as a site giving greater recreational value to both locals and visitors. A two-stage development is now proposed for Warrena Weir, with the first stage being costed for the Business Case.

#### (a) Relevance to Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework

- ED1.2 Develop our economy, including the visitor economy.
- I1.5 Adopt successful strategies that maximise our community's access to quality infrastructure and assets.

#### (b) Financial Considerations

 None at this stage. The grant is being managed by Gilgandra Shire Council. The recommendation is to accept the documents for future funding opportunities as they arise.

#### **COMMENTARY**

The three documents – the Community Engagement Report, the draft Real Country Destination Strategic Plan and the draft Business Cases – were publicly exhibited from 20 December 2023 to 9 February 2024.



Information was provided on the three Councils' social media platforms, as well as via email distribution to businesses, community groups and economic development committees and Chambers of Commerce.

Community submissions received to date include questions and concerns regarding flood management, river health, water security and funding. Supportive comments speak to tourism spend, beautification and local pride. The number of submissions is inversely proportional to the participation in the community consultation meetings. Where there was significant engagement by the community in these meetings, such as in Coonamble and Coonabarabran, few submissions questioned the proposed projects; where only a handful of people engaged in the community consultation meetings in Gilgandra, many submissions have been received.

*People, Place and Partnership*, the consultant engaged for the project, has also provide commentary in response to the submissions.

Funding is due for acquittal with the NSW Government by 31 March 2024.







#### 'The outback beach': Triple tourism treats proposed along bush river

Three sister councils in the state's west have teamed together to attract tourism with a "town beach". Here's what else is included in the plans.





None of the submissions received from any of the Council areas addressed the Strategy document. Council officers involved in the project across all three Shires find the document adequate for the twin aims of marketing the region and in supporting future grant applications.

Two submissions addressed the proposed Business Case for the development of the Warrena Weir Reserve, one from an individual (Submission 10) and one from the Coonamble Aquatic Club (Submission 25). Both are in favour of the project, in principle, with the Aquatic Club raising some concerns about future management of the site.

Given this support, it is recommended Council accept the submissions and endorse the Strategic Plan and Business Cases, anticipating that significant future development at the Warrena Weir Reserve would be funded through grant monies.

When adopted, the proposed two-stage development at the Weir will be incorporated into the draft Warrena Creek Reserve Plan of Management. The operational concerns of the Coonamble Aquatic Club can be addressed during public exhibition of this draft Plan of Management and any modifications to the proposed development considered at that time.

Once accepted by Council and forwarded to Crown Lands for its endorsement, it is likely that only those proposed works and operations included in the Plan of Management will be approved by Crown Lands, thus the importance of capturing and including all possible development and operational concerns now, rather than request approval for a usage not within the Plan of Management.

#### (a) Governance/Policy Implications

A Plan of Management for the proposed Warrena Creek Reserve will need to be finalised and endorsed by Crown Lands to allow the developments proposed for this site. New policies may also be needed to manage public utilisation of the site.

#### (b) Legal Implications

There are no legal implications in relation to the endorsement of the documents.

#### (c) Social Implications

A particular focus has been on not only developing projects that have appeal to tourists but that also increase local community usage of key sites, such as Warrena Creek Reserve in Coonamble.

#### (d) Environmental Implications

The proposed Warrena Creek Reserve development continues existing usage.

#### (e) Economic/Asset Management Implications

External funding will need to be pursued to realise the proposed Warrena Creek Reserve development, with the possibility of a co-contribution from Council being required. Asset management plans will need to be developed and implemented for any built infrastructure.

#### (f) Risk Implications

There are no risk implications at this time in endorsing the documentation.

#### RECOMMENDATION

#### That Council:

- 1. Note the community submissions received, along with the commentary provided by the consultant, *People, Place and Partnership*.
- 2. Formally endorse the Real Country Destination Strategic Plan and the Business Case for the Warrena Creek Reserve, incorporating any amendments following consideration of relevant submissions.
- 3. Note the learning captured in the Community Engagement Report, from *People, Place and Partnership* and incorporate this into future community engagement initiatives where appropriate.
- 4. Authorise the General Manager to pursue opportunities to fund the implementation of the endorsed business case for the Warrena Creek Reserve development and the marketing initiatives detailed in the Real Country Destination Strategic Plan.
- 5. Consider allocating funding in the 2024-25 Budget to begin implementation of marketing strategies identified in the Real Country Destination Strategic Plan.
- 6. Finalise the draft Plan of Management of the Warrena Creek Reserve to guide future development at the site.

#### Public Exhibition Submissions Feedback

The Real Country Project has elicited a broad spectrum of community feedback, with a total of 25 submissions being received during the exhibition process, reflecting a dynamic balance of enthusiasm and concern. While there is strong support for the vision to enhance tourism and recreational amenities, apprehensions about sustainability, safety, and resource allocation underscore the importance of responsive and adaptive jalaning.

#### With specific feedback falling under three key areas:

#### Feedback and Acknowledgement of Real Country Strategy

The community sentiment is mixed, with some expressing strong support for the project's potential to enhance tourism and local recreation, while others are concerned about the practicality and sustainability amidst flood risks. Considerations include ensuring intorough planning that accounts for environmental and safety considerations, and leveraging local expertise to ensure infrastructure resilience. The Real Country Destration Strategic Plan has been updated to ensure river activations are safe during flood events, with each Council responsible for monitoring. Additionally, digital signage installed in town centres will provide operational updates and advise during weather-related events, ensuring visitor and community safety and informed decision-making.

#### Additional Ideas for Future Consideration in Tourism Infrastructure for Real Country

Community feedback suggests interest in diversifying recreational offerings, such as splash parks and adventure playgrounds, which are considered safe and appealing for families. There's a call for investment in local infrastructure that directly benefits residents and has the potential to attract visitors sustainably. Considerations focus on incorporating community-supported amentiles and ensuring maintenance and safety are integral to the project designs. The community's feedback will be instrumental for the Real Country Councils in shaping future planning and strategic endeavors. This engagement process's insights will guide the enhancement and development of initiatives and catalyst projects within the Real Country Destination Strategic Plan, ensuring that community preferences and ideas are central to evolving recreational and infrastructural offerings.

This collective feedback underscores the necessity for a collaborative approach, ensuring that the projects not only captivate the unique spirit and needs of the Real Country region but also stand as testaments to the community's shared aspirations and concerns. As we move forward, integrating these insights will be crucial in sculpting projects that are both visionary and grounded, promising a future where every initiative enriches the community's fabric and resilience.

To whom it may concern,

The Coonamble Aquatic Club would like to show their support towards this project, we feel the Warrena Weir has always been a fantastic facility for our community that hasn't been used to its full potential due to lack of consultation and assistance physically & financially.

The plans (5.3) page 32-38 look amazing. The committee held a meeting on Monday the 5<sup>th</sup> of February and would like to put some minor concerns / suggestions forward. We feel that if we can work together, we can achieve an outcome that will be beneficial for the club and local community.

#### Club concerns / suggestions:

- BOAT RAMP: The map on Page 34 of the business case project does not include the boat ramp. Will a boat ramp still be available to members, and will our committee still be able to have this boat ramp locked to control what boats are and aren't on the water?
- FENCED AREA: As per previous meetings with Council it was suggested that there would still be some type of fenced area for club members? Will this be the case, or will it be one open area?
- TOILET BLOCK: Will the current toilet block stay and be used by the members, or will a new toilet block be built that will service the campers? At a previous meeting with council, we discussed splitting the toilet block.?
- WEIR FLOOD GATES: As we all know the flood gates have not been maintained and are not currently in working order, will the flood gates be replaced as part of this project? We feel this is crucial in keeping your new infrastructure flood safe.
- SHELTERS/SEATING AREA: In the pictures it looks as though all shelters will be replaced so
  they all look the same all the way around which we are in favour of but we ask that they be
  replaced with the same amount of seating, hot summer days when the weir is full we
  struggle to have enough seating areas around the boating area.
- PARKING: Will there be adequate parking around the ski area for cars and boat trailers?
- PONTOONS: Is there a legal depth that the water must be around the swimming pontoons?
  The designated swimming area is in the shallowest part of the weir, is it possible to be
  cleaned out? Is there a requirement for lifesavers to be in operation when the pontoons are
  in use?
- ACCOMODATION: We question if there is a need for more RV camping and cabins within our
  community. With the local caravan park, the showground, Nakkadoo, local airbnb's, motels
  and the potential camping that will be available at the new bore bath facility we feel there
  isn't a need for extra accommodation options, use maintain and support the options we
  already have available.
  - With people using the accommodation that may bring boats with them how do you propose that memberships to the club would be controlled? We are a volunteer committee that aren't available to open the boat ramp at all hours, this would have to be pre organised with the committee and the boat owner would have to provide the committee with paperwork to ensure we are abiding by our insurance policy. If this becomes a popular spot to ski will locals

get priority? At Nyngan caravan park they only allow a small amount of skier to stay as the local ski club is quite busy and it becomes too dangerous on the water.

- WALKING TRACK: All members at the meeting were in agreeance that the best place for the
  walking track would be along the top of the existing levy bank. Some of the concerns that
  come from members were:
  - Will the track be fully fenced to keep motorbikes off the track?
  - How will the track hold up in a flood?
  - Will there be disability access to the track?
  - Will there be emergency access to the track? There are quite a few points of access for emergency crews along the top of the levy.
- MAINTNANCE: Our biggest concern is the maintenance that will be involved in this, and the
  other projects proposed. Most businesses in town are struggling when it comes to employing
  staff, the community is at an all time low when it comes to recruitment options. Currently
  volunteers maintain the weir grounds, when they are extended to the proposed plans that
  will not be possible.

As we have said we are in favour of a revamp of this area, we believe we need it. Keep it SIMPLE, SIMPLE works in the bush and it's been proven by other councils.

Members have been and used other ski and water recreational areas around and we urge you all to take the time to go look at them for yourselves. Forbes, Goondiwindi and the Bogan shires are all great examples of these.
